## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **PREAMBLE**

St. Joseph's College is a legacy of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, handed down to the present management by the venerable fathers of the "Society of the Foreign Mission of Paris" (Mission Etrangeres de Paris, shortly MEP). Its nucleus was the St. Joseph's High School which was started 148 years ago in 1868 A.D. This school was elevated into a college in 1884 A.D. through the efforts of Reverend Father Tarbes MEP and was affiliated to the University of Madras. The District Gazetteer, South Arcot District has recorded St. Joseph's College as the prime educational institution and the only college in the district in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. It once again reverted as a High School in 1909 due to financial and other constraints. Since then there were several attempts to revive the College. The dream became a reality when the college was reborn as **ST. JOSEPH'S COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCE** in 1991. The college was affiliated to the University of Madras from August 1991 to October 2002 and later the College has been affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University, Vellore.

The College was included under section 2(f) of UGC Act 1956 on 4<sup>th</sup> November, 2004 and under section 12(B) on 28<sup>th</sup> August 2015. The College obtained permanent affiliation on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2008 and was conferred Autonomous Status on 17<sup>th</sup> June 2008. The college has been re-accredited by NAAC with 'A' Grade since 16<sup>th</sup> September 2011.

The institution offers 11 Under Graduate Programmes, 11 Post Graduate Programmes, 9 M.Phil. Programmes and 3 Ph.D. Programmes. The college operates under shift system. In UG Shift - I is for boy students and Shift - II is for girl students. All PG and M.Phil. courses are co-educational. The total strength of the teaching faculty of the institution is 177 and that of non-teaching is 63. The total number of students studying in the college is 5592 of which 2222 are male and 3370 are female.

## **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

St. Joseph's College was given autonomy in the year 2008. Since then the college has taken strenuous efforts to provide quality education through its innovative and dynamic curriculum. The basis for the development of curriculum is the need

assessment and was designed to satisfy the needs of the stakeholders and goals of the institution. The process was mediated by the *Curriculum Development Committee*, the *Board of Studies* and the *Academic Council* in which apart from subject experts, representatives from industry and research bodies are included as members. The curriculum has been meticulously prepared to make the students excel in knowledge and skill and become employable. It is being ensured that the curriculum is innovative, research oriented and addresses the needs of the society.

The curriculum follows *Choice Based Credit System* which has academic flexibility as the core substance and is executed to the maximum possible level. The choices are many for the students in the allied and the elective subjects.

To provide a wholesome education to the students and to make them realize their social responsibilities, participation in extra-curricular activities and extension activities are brought into the curriculum. Participation in these activities is mandatory for the completion of the course and two credits are given in the UG curriculum. In addition to the core and allied subjects, *Value Education* and *Personality Development* are *included in the UG curriculum* to build the character of the student community. To promote skill development *skill based subjects* are taught in UG second year which are mostly *interdisciplinary in nature*. Environmental Science for UG programme and Human Rights for PG programme are offered as per the regulations of UGC.

A rigorous process of review of the curriculum is done annually through feedback from the stakeholders and through academic audit once in three years.

#### CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The admission process of the college is transparent and the information about the institution and the available courses are publicized through regional newspaper, college website and prospectus. The norms laid down by the state government are followed and preference in admission is given to deserving candidates from socially and economically weaker sections, women, sports persons and persons with disabilities. There is a steady increase in the number of courses offered and in the number of students admitted. The college admits students from diverse background and their needs also vary. The differences in requirements of the students are identified and the teaching-learning activities are designed accordingly. *Orientation Programme for the freshers, Bridge Course* in selected subjects, *Remedial Classes* for the *slow learners* and *special coaching* for the *advanced learners* are some of the special features in this category.

All academic and co-curricular activities of the institution are properly planned and executed meticulously. *Academic calendar* and teaching plans are prepared to complete the activities in a timely manner. The *learning is made student centric* and ICT tools are effectively used in teaching and learning. Internet facilities are made available in the campus so as to facilitate e-learning. Subject experts and people of eminence from distant and near institutions are invited to share their knowledge and expertise through lectures and seminars. The teaching process and the co-curricular / extra-curricular activities are planned to nurture creativity and inculcate scientific temper. The institution gets feedback from the students on teaching and learning through feedback questionnaire, student forum and interaction with students.

Academically qualified and talented teachers are appointed who equip themselves by attending seminars, conferences and workshops. All the newly appointed staff members are either with Ph.D. or NET/SET qualified and the staff members who were appointed earlier have completed their Ph.D. or on the verge of completion. The total number of staff members with Ph.D. is 31 and those who have cleared NET/SET is 13. Staff development programme on various themes of higher education are conducted regularly by the institution.

The evaluation process of the college is made known to all the stakeholders and continuously refined and reformed to make the autonomous status of the college accountable. Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) of the students is given due importance to improve their performance. The CIA of the students are monitored and assessed through diverse components decided by the faculty. The examination process carried out by the Office of the Controller of Examinations is fully computerized and the exam results are published on time. Grievances of the students related to evaluation are redressed as per the norms. Provisions for re-valuation and instant examination for the final year candidates who fail in only one paper are salient features of redressal.

The students' performance and the learning outcomes are assessed regularly to plan strategies for better performance.

## CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

Having established itself in academics, the institution turns its focus towards research. Two committees have been established to take care of research – *Research Committee* and *Apex Research Committee*. These committees develop policies on research related activities and monitor the execution and progress. Research culture is promoted by way of upgrading the laboratories, organizing seminars and workshops on research. The *Research Development Cell (RDC)* promotes and facilitates research

projects in the institution by distributing the circulars, providing details of projects, etc. Thrust areas for research are identified in each department to carry out projects and interdisciplinary research is encouraged. A few of the PG and M.Phil. projects include interdisciplinary work as a component. The college has been granted 12(B) status which is a boon in promoting research. Seminars, conferences and workshops are regularly conducted by all the departments with eminent resource persons.

The departments are constantly upgraded to research departments to offer M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes. There are 9 departments which offer M.Phil. programmes and 3 departments offer Ph.D. programmes. Thirty six staff members have been recognized by the university to guide M.Phil. scholars and 82 staff members are guiding PG projects.

There is provision in the annual budget for spending on research. Some of the research projects carried out at the departmental level is financially supported by the management. Necessary instruments and infrastructure are made available and upgraded for research courses as and when required. Four research laboratories and two centres have been established to facilitate research. *Common Instrumentation Centre* and *Quantum Computational Research Laboratory* are the notable additions which cater not only to the institution but also to the scholars and researchers of other institutions. A total of 556 papers have been published and 565 papers have been presented by the faculty. Several papers have also been published / presented from the research work by M.Phil. scholars. The college publishes a research journal entitled *St. Joseph's Journal of Humanities and Science*. Staff members of the institution have written chapters in books and also edited books. Some of them are reviewers in national and international journals.

The institution is taking necessary steps to promote consultancy and there are MoUs for providing consultancy to external agencies. To fulfill the social responsibility of the institution, ten social service organizations are functioning in the college in which students can enroll themselves and do social service. In addition, subjectwise department associations also carryout community projects and charity work. The college has received *Best Blood Donating College Award* for the past five years consecutively. Extension activity is made compulsory for the students and has been included in the curriculum.

Collaboration with other national and international institutions has been initiated successfully. A MoU has been signed between the college and the *Faculty of Science, Universiti Teknologi Malaysia, Malaysia* to promote educational and research collaboration. There is also collaboration with companies and corporate sectors to provide training and placement for the students.

## CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The institution is situated in a vast campus spread over an area of 21 acres and can easily be reached from the surrounding places. To accommodate the increasing number of students and staff, the infrastructure is being expanded continuously. The *Planning and Evaluation Committee* assesses the infrastructure needs of the institution and ensures that they are fulfilled. Separate hostels for men and women are available with all necessary facilities. An infirmary with a medical officer and a nursing assistant is available.

The institution provides necessary infrastructure facilities in the form of grounds and courts to promote sports and games. A *Fine Arts Club* is functioning in the college to coordinate cultural events and competitions both within and outside the institution. A separate room is given to practice for cultural events and an indoor auditorium is available for conducting cultural events.

A *Central Library* is functioning in a separate building and its activities are administered by two librarians and a *Library Advisory Committee*. Around 30,000 print books and 6,000 e-books are available in the library. Internet, reprographic and printing facilities are provided to the staff and students in the library.

Around two hundred and seventy computers, two hundred in the computer laboratory and the remaining in science laboratories and other sections, are available in the institution. The computers are maintained by the technical assistants available in the department of Computer Science and specific maintenance works are outsourced. The *entire campus is WiFi enabled* and all the computers in the campus are interconnected through *LAN facility*.

The maintenance of infrastructure in the campus is coordinated by the Works Manager and monitored by Planning and Evaluation Committee.

#### CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The institution caters to the needs of about 5592 students from diverse backgrounds. To support them in academic and personal endeavours *Mentoring System* is practiced. Students are given individual attention and their progression is regularly monitored. *Career Guidance, Counselling* and *Soft Skill Development Programmes* are frequently organized. *College Prospectus* and *Students' Hand Book* provide all necessary information and explain the rules and regulations of the college. Concession on fees is one of the highlights of the institution. On an average every year 730 students have benefitted through *fees concession* which amounts to *rupees* 24 lakhs per year. Specific support services are provided to students who are

physically challenged and socially / economically disadvantaged. Students who participate in sports and games and cultural events are given special coaching and training and TA/DA is also given to them for attending competitions. Special diet, uniforms and necessary materials are provided to the sports students. The *Career Guidance and Placement Cell* of the college organizes various training programmes apart from on-campus and off-campus interviews. An *Alumni Association* is effectively functioning in the institution and provide academic and placement support for the students. To address the grievances of the students the college has *Student Forum, Students Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-ragging Committee* and *Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee*. To motivate women students *Women Empowerment Cell* is also functioning.

The success rate of students in most of the courses is in the range of seventy to eighty percent. The percentage of drop outs is very meagre. The number of students who are appearing / qualifying in competitive examinations and CSIR, UGC-NET etc. are increasing. Special coaching for civil services, UGC-CSIR-NET and other competitive examinations are given to the students.

Students of the college dominate in most of the university sports and games teams and represent at the state, national and international level. In the Thiruvalluvar University Women Football Team, almost the entire team has St. Joseph's College students as members (17 out of 20 in 2013-14, 18 out of 20 in 2014-15 and 20 out of 20 in 2015-2016). This team has won the Tamil Nadu Chief Minister's Trophy consecutively for four times, South India Inter-university Tournament three times consecutively and All India Inter-university Tournament once. The evidence for the outstanding performance of the college in sports is that the Kabaddi Team has won the championship at the divisional and inter-divisional level for twenty consecutive years.

The views of the students and their suggestions are collected through Students Forum meetings and feedback questionnaire. Students are also given chances to represent themselves in certain committees of the college.

#### CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE AND LEADERSHIP

St. Joseph's College has been established with a vision to serve the society and is working towards that vision with a stated mission policy. The college being situated in a socially and economically backward area mainly gets students from poor families who seek employment immediately after studies. Hence the college is striving to provide wholesome and integral education to the students to promote employability.

The management believes in decentralization as an effective means of successful administration and has constituted several committees to plan and develop strategies. Autonomy is given to the departments in academic related issues and to some extent in administrative matters. Thus participative management is ensured. A cordial relationship is maintained with the stakeholders and the management frequently interacts with them. Students Forum Meetings, Staff Meetings, Parent-Teacher-Students Meetings, lectures by researchers and representatives from industries are the means by which the institution interacts with the stakeholders.

Culture of excellence is reinforced among the staff and students by recognizing and rewarding outstanding performances. *Knowledge Management* is accomplished by facilitating the staff members to write books, publish and present papers. The institution contributes to national development by orienting the activities of service organizations like NSS, NCC, YRC, ROTARACT, etc. towards nation building. The curricular and co-curricular activities of the institution are designed to foster global competencies and to inculcate value system among students.

The Planning and Evaluation Committee of the college develops policies and strategies for the institution and prepares the prospective annual plan and future plan. The autonomous status given to the college is effectively utilized for designing a curriculum to promote employability and knowledge enrichment.

Strategies are developed for faculty empowerment and efforts are taken to develop and enhance leadership skills among the staff. Staff members with leadership qualities are duly recognized and assigned new tasks. Staff members are motivated to attend seminars, conferences and workshops on academics and research. *Performance Based Self Appraisal* is obtained from all the staff members and reviewed every year. The outcome of the appraisal is informed to the staff members for further improvement. Several staff welfare schemes are introduced and *financial support for medical expenses*, *concession on fees for the wards of the staff members* are some of the schemes apart from the regular ones.

The finance of the college is monitored by the *Finance Committee* of the college. The income and expenditure of the college is managed through an annual budget and the accounts are audited every year. The main source of income for the college is fees paid by the students. Establishment of *Endowment Scholarships* by philanthropists and generation of funds from funding agencies for organizing seminars and workshops are the other means. The 12(B) status attained by the college has yet to be made use of.

The college has an *Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)* functioning to promote and maintain the quality of the institution. *Academic Audit* is performed

once in three years to review the curriculum, evaluation and research of the departments. *Feedback* is obtained from the stakeholders by the IQAC to sustain the quality.

## **CRITERION VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES**

Being one of the renowned educational institutions in the district, St. Joseph's College has introduced a few innovative practices and follows certain best practices. The commitment of the college towards *Green and Healthy Environment* is reflected in its activities. *Green Audit* of the campus is conducted once in a year. Various clubs and social service organizations available in the campus are carrying out *action oriented* as well as *Awareness Programmes on Environment*. *Tree Plantation* both within the campus and outside the campus is carried out by several departments of the college. An active *Enviro Club* is functioning in the college.

Some of the innovative practices of the college includes *Orientation* Programme for the Freshers, Computer Literacy Programme, Talk On My Research, Multidisciplinary Activities by the Departmental Associations, Technical Symposium as a Learning Method, Computer based test for CIA and Publication of Text Book by the Institution.

Common Assembly, Cash Award for Best Paper Publication, Bridge Course, Endowment Scholarships, Fees Concession, Value Education, Staff Development Programmes, Communication through SMS and E-mail to reduce paper usage and Feedback from Stakeholders are some of the best practices followed by the institution.

St. Joseph's College of Arts & Science has a rich legacy of academic excellence and is striving to retain the same in the future also. The institution believes that the present process of assessment and accreditation will prove the same.

- Bringing in companies for campus interview is a difficult task.
- Retaining highly qualified staff members is a problem in the self financing setup.
- The demand ratio for many courses, especially PG courses, is low which results in admitting students with less mark in the qualifying examination.
- Opportunity for the staff members to provide consultancy.
- Increasing number of students in college demands more infrastructure.
- Making the students who are poor in communication to face the interviews is a tough job.
- Enabling PG students and M.Phil. scholars to clear CSIR/UGC-NET/SET.

- To provide a wholesome education to the students and to make them realize their social responsibilities, participation in extracurricular activities and extension activities are brought into the curriculum. Participation in these activities is mandatory for the completion of the course and two credits are given in the UG curriculum.
- In addition to the core and allied subjects, *Value Education* and *Personality Development* are *included in the UG curriculum* to build the character of the student community.
- To promote skill development, *skill based subjects* are taught in UG second year which are mostly *interdisciplinary in nature*. The following subjects are offered under this category.

The institution advertises through Regional News Papers, Local Cable Network and Institution's Website.

To ensure transparency in admission, the institution displays the list of selected candidates according to the cut-off marks. It also displays the list of students in the waiting list.

The admission process is carried out by the Admission Committee of the college.

#### **UG** Courses

Students are selected on the basis of merit and personal interview.

#### PG Courses

Students are selected on the basis of merit, performance in the Entrance examination and personal interview.

#### M.Phil. Courses

A merit list of the eligible candidates is prepared and Entrance examination is conducted. Short listed candidates are called for personal interview and according to the rank, students are selected.

#### Ph.D. Courses

Applications are invited from candidates seeking admission for Ph.D. programme. The selection will be based on the marks obtained in PG / M.Phil., the marks obtained in the entrance examination and interview conducted by the college.

The admission process is promptly reviewed by the Admission Committee under the supervision of representatives of the Management.

The findings of the review process helps in modifying the admission procedure.

Based on the demand for the courses the cut-off marks are decided from time-to-time.

#### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 Does the College organize orientation / induction programme for freshers? If yes, give details of the duration of programme, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

Every year the college organizes an *orientation / bridge course for the freshers*.

The course is conducted for two weeks which covers *general* discipline, rules and regulation of the autonomous pattern, curriculum and evaluation, extra-curricular activities / clubs available in the college and the like.

Senior faculty of different disciplines of the college are invited as resource persons for the conduct of the programme.

Feedback from the participants is collected after the programme and based on the suggestions the course is restructured in the subsequent years.

2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of student population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Yes, after the admission the senior faculty of the department interacts with the students to identify the key issues like, *medium of instruction at the school level, fluency of the students in English, learning ability*, etc.

Possible strategies to address the issues are developed and implemented.

# 2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

Alongwith the *Orientation Course* a *Bridge Course in English* is conducted for the freshers *before the beginning of each academic year*.

Remedial classes are conducted for the slow-learners by the respective departments. These classes are conducted in the afternoon session for Shift-I students and in the forenoon session for the Shift-II students.

# 2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - student from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

Mentor system is practiced in the college to regularly monitor the performance of students.

Students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners are given special care.

Remedial classes are conducted, study materials are given and additional tests are conducted. This resulted in the improvement in the academic performance of the students.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

Performance of the students in the first semester is used to categorize students in to slow learners and advanced learners.

The subject teachers are asked to find out the learning needs of the advanced learners and encourage them to read latest books and magazines to expand the scope of their subject knowledge.

They are encouraged to submit additional assignments and attend seminars.

# 2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Class-rooms are re-arranged for the convenience of differently-abled students if required.

Scribing for visually challenged and differently-abled students is arranged during examinations.

Government schemes and policies are made known to the students with disability. Staff of the college ensure that the students of this category benefit out of such schemes.

# 2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

An academic calendar is prepared every year detailing the work plan for each semester with schedule for teaching, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and examinations.

Staff members prepare teaching plan for each subject in the beginning of every semester which help in completing the syllabus on time.

# 2.3.2 Does the College provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Yes, the course outline and course schedule are prepared by the teaching faculty before the commencement of the academic session. Every month the teaching faculty are asked to submit the monthly report to the IQAC, which in turn compares it with the course schedule already submitted.

All theory courses are predominantly taught through lecture method.

In addition the following methods are practiced

- Power point presentations
- Use of OHP
- Guest lectures by Resource persons
- Group discussion
- Student seminar / Assignments
- Field Trips / Study Tour / Industrial Visits
- Exhibition / Poster Presentations

# 2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

To make learning more effective, students centric approach is followed.

Students are asked to present seminars regularly to develop communication and presentation skills.

Assignments both from the syllabus and outside the syllabus are given to students to promote self study.

*Poster Exhibits* explaining the subject concepts are prepared by the students.

*Group Discussion* to kindle analytical thinking has been encouraged.

*Project Work* and *Case Studies* to provide a wider exposure is also practiced.

## 2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

The college encourages the departments to have subject-wise associations which organize guest lectures and invited talks regularly.

The departments also organize seminars, workshops and conferences for the students wherein subject experts are invited.

Research Development Cell and students support services like NSS, Rotaract, RRC and YRC etc. are also allowed to invite experts from various fields to deliver lectures for the students.

## 2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Majority of the teaching faculty have started using PowerPoint presentation for teaching.

Handouts and soft copies of the teaching contents are supplied to the students by the faculty.

Faculty encourages the students to refer to online resources and e-books to widen the learning arena.

Video showing experimental protocols are displayed for the students. Online demonstration of experiments is also made use of by the faculty.

The Department of English makes use of audio-visual aids available in the language lab.

# 2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counselors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

The teachers are assigned a class for mentoring the students. They maintain academic records and personal details of the students assigned to them. Psycho-social guidance is provided to the needy students by the mentors.

Faculty of Department of Psychology provide Psycho-social guidance on specific issues if the students approach them. On an average 5 to 10 students are counseled per week.

# 2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? Interdisciplinary teaching is provided by the faculty of computer applications for the students of Microbiology on the subject Computer Applications in Biology.

Faculty of Commerce, Computer Science, Computer Applications, Mathematics, Physics, Biochemistry, Chemistry and Microbiology make use of Poster Presentations by the students as a teaching method.

To encourage self-learning by the students, faculty of Computer Science and Computer Applications conduct competitions on technical oriented subjects.

These types of teaching make the students interested in the subjects and help them understand complicated topics in a simple way.

Students' feedback on teachers reflects the outcome of innovative teaching.

The teachers are duly recognized for adopting innovative teaching methods.

## 2.3.9 How does the College create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

*Inter-departmental competitions* are conducted every year which include competitions where creativity is focused.

The Departments of Commerce (*Students' Eye* and *Commet*), Computer Science (*COMPEIN*), Computer Applications (*TechXtra*) and Social Work (*Talent Expo*) organizes competitions on their respective subjects every year to instill creativity among the students.

Students are given opportunity to *present papers on research topics* in seminars organized at departmental level as well as inter-collegiate level.

Students are motivated to take part in competitions and seminars conducted by other institutions and organizations.

*Project works* are made mandatory in all PG programmes to develop scientific temper among students. In a few departments UG students also have projects.

An in-house journal, *St. Joseph's Journal of Humanities and Science* published by the college encourages students to publish their research articles.

Eminent scholars and scientists from research institutes are invited

for giving guest lectures on recent trends to motivate the students in scientific research.

All the departments are provided with computers having internet facility to prepare teaching materials and update the subject knowledge.

Departments of Computer Science and Computer Applications provide technical support to the faculty of other departments in computer-aided teaching.

Feedback on teachers from the students are collected by the IQAC every year and evaluated. The outcomes and suggestions are informed to the respective staff members for improvement.

Since there was not much variation in the double valuation in evaluation of the semester examination for *Post Graduation*, it was changed in to *Single Valuation*. As a result of this the duration of evaluation process is reduced to some extent.

#### **Instant Examination**

Students of final year courses who failed in only one paper are given a chance of writing the examination for that particular paper immediately after the publication of results. This instant examination has helped a considerable number of students to complete their degree in the same academic year.

## 2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

Instead of depending only on terminal performance, emphasis is laid upon continuous performance i.e. *Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA)* during each semester.

Flexibility in CIA pattern has been provided to the staff members to make evaluation process more innovative. Seminars, Assignments, Project Works, Group Discussion, Case Study, etc. are introduced as major parameters for evaluating the student performance. Thus the CIA pattern ensures the progress of the students in each semester.

# 2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of the internal assessment process?

25% of the marks in each *theory paper* and 40% marks in each *practical paper* are assessed by Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA).

The CIA process is open and transparent and the students are informed of their performance and marks then and there.

The entry of the marks under different categories are verified and cross checked by the Office of the Controller of Examinations.

## 2.5.5 Does the College adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

The college adheres to the examination schedule which is proposed and published in the college calendar without any delay.

# 2.5.6 What is the average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the College for the publication of examination results e.g., website, SMS, email, etc.

The average time taken to declare the examination results is *three* weeks and the results are published in the *college website* apart from being displayed in the *notice board*.

## **2.5.7** Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

- Pre-examination processes Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- Examination process Examination material management, logistics.
- Post examination process attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

The Office of the Controller of Examinations is fully computerized. An automated *Electronic Controller of Examinations Office System* is the package used for the *Pre-examination, Examination and Post examination Process*.

Examination material management and logistics of exam materials are managed by the Office of the Controller of Examinations and a team of support staff.

## 2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The first candidate of the Ph.D. programme of the college is yet to complete the course; hence no reforms have been introduced so far. At present the rules and regulations of the parent university is followed.

# 2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/ section?

The term of Office of the Controller of Examinations (CoE) is fixed and the post is given on rotational basis. As per the norms a change in the headship of the Office of the Controller of Examinations is made.

Infrastructural arrangements of the Office of the Controller of Examinations have been modified as per their request.

Necessary changes have been made in the software used in the Office of the Controller of Examinations.

### 2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

There is a provision for applying for revaluation, if the candidate desires. A photocopy of the answer scripts will be given to the students against the request and payment of a required fee and if the candidate wishes he/she can apply for re-evaluation of the paper.

Issues related to CIA have to be represented to the concerned faculty or to the head of the department if there is a necessity.

Other grievances can be represented to the Controller of Examinations directly.

#### 2.6. Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

## 2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes for its programmes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes. Each programme has clearly stated learning outcome which is given in the syllabus. Copies of syllabi are given to the staff as well as the students at the beginning of the course.

The Students are made aware of these learning outcomes in the first interaction/Orientation programmes where the faculty addresses all the students.

## 2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

Periodical tests, Continuous Internal Assessments and End-Semester examinations are conducted to monitor the achievement of learning outcomes. The results of these examinations are discussed with the students and among the faculty to ensure the achievement.

# 2.6.3 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for overcoming barriers of learning?

Based on the results of Periodical tests, Continuous Internal Assessments and End-Semester examinations subject-wise reports are obtained from the faculty by the Principal. Students who failed

in the exams and slow-learners are identified and remedial classes are conducted for them.

#### **MOODLE** based Teaching-Learning

MOODLE is a practice followed by the department of Computer Applications. MOODLE is an online tool which is used to extend the scope of teaching and learning to a broader level. Using MOODLE the staff members will upload the course materials prepared by them and this will enable the students to access the same online from anywhere. Many students are finding this method useful.

#### **Computer based test for CIA**

To reduce time and the use of papers on trial basis a computer based test is conducted in selected subjects for CIA. The students can take up multiple choice questions and have to answer them within a given period of time. The results are available immediately after the exam. Both students and staff members find this useful in terms of time consumption. The department of Computer Applications has conducted this type of test for their students.

#### **External Evaluation**

To maintain quality and to have accountability question paper setting is done by faculty from other institutions. Also in case of evaluation all the examiners are external members for the PG courses. However for the UG courses two third of the examiners are external members.

- Awareness programmes on various social issues by different social service organizations and academic departments

are some of the important outreach programmes in which students and staff members have actively participated.

Through the service organizations and clubs available in the college community oriented programmes are regularly conducted in the nearby villages.

As part of the extension programme, the academic departments also organize awareness programmes and social service camps in and around the institution.

Computer Literacy Programmes conducted for the students of nearby schools and villages are regularly organized by the departments of Computer Science and Computer Applications.

Blood Donation to the needy and to the Government General Hospital, Cuddalore is a regular feature of the institution and the

college has received *Best Blood Donating Institution* award in the district consecutively for five years.

A series of *Environmental Awareness Programmes* and *Tree Plantation Programmes* have been conducted with the help of students in nearby schools and villages.

The Department of Computer Applications organized a free *Eye Checkup Camp* in association with Aravind Eye Hospital, Puducherry on 21-09-2013. Apart from students and staff of the college public were also benefited from the camp. Free spectacles were given to the public with defective eye sight.

# 3.6.6 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the College, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated?

Extension activities have been introduced in the curriculum with an objective of exposing the students to the real life and to have an interaction with the society wherein they live.

By going to various places like villages, schools, home for the aged people / mentally challenged people, orphanages, the students meet people of different categories and have a tinge of practical life. Based on the subjects they study, the students create awareness among the public and thus gain more practical knowledge.

For example students of *Biochemistry* create awareness on non-communicable diseases like *Cancer* and *Diabetes* and students of *Microbiology* create awareness on *HIV/AIDS*, *Hepatitis* and *Waterborne Diseases*. Students of *Computer Science* and *Computer Applications* teach *Basics of Computers* to the rural children and thus become familiar with the subject.

Extension programmes are planned to serve the public in the district where the college is located. The programmes are organized for the community and have them as beneficiaries. # 3.7.1 How has the College's collaboration with other agencies impacted the visibility, identity and diversity of activities on the campus? To what extent has the College benefitted academically and financially because of collaborations?

The college has informal collaboration with other agencies to carry out joint research programmes, student projects and extension activities.

The college collaborates with *Pondicherry Multipurpose Social Service Society (PMSSS)*, *Puducherry*, in carrying out *Skill Development Programmes* and *Social Services*. The joint venture with PMSSS has resulted in several programmes carried out not only for the students of the institution but also for the alumni and the unemployed youth.

The Quantum Computational Research Laboratory of the Department of Physics extends support to researchers from institutions all over the state on Quantum Computational Research. This type of collaboration has resulted in sixteen (published -9, under review -7) joint publications in peer reviewed journals, thus making the institution known among the researchers in this field.

The Department of Microbiology had a collaborative project with Sri. Ramachandra Medical College and Research Institute, Chennai for the Estimation of Hepatitis among Irula Tribes of Tamil Nadu and Puducherry. The project was funded by Indian Council of Medical and Research (ICMR), under ICMR Adhoc Projects under Tribal Sub-Plan. (Project No.2010-12670, Duration: 01-10-2012 to 30-09-2015)

The Department of Computer Applications collaborated with Christian Medical College, Vellore and carried out relief and rehabilitation work Vilva Nagar and Rajambal Nagar of Cuddalore District.

The college has recently signed a MoU with Faculty of Science, Universiti Teknologi Malaysia, Malaysia to promote educational and research collaboration.

MoUs have also been signed with *Study Metro Pvt. Ltd.*, *Bengaluru*, *ICT Academy of Tamil Nadu*, and *Tata Consultancy Services Limited*.

PG and Research Department of Physics has taken initiative to sign a Memorandum of Understanding with King Saud University, Saudi Arabia.

To promote research among the scholars and students publication of papers in journals and presentation of papers in seminars and conferences have been made compulsory. With this effort several papers have been published / presented out of M.Phil. research.

### 4.1 Physical Facilities

### 4.1.1 How does the College plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?

The college has a *Planning and Evaluation Committee* which assesses the needs of the existing and newly introduced courses and recommend to the management for additional infrastructure. The Heads of the Departments also forward their infrastructural requirements. Based on this new facilities are provided.

The classrooms after the regular class hours are utilized for coaching classes and remedial classes.

The *Indoor Auditorium* is utilized for organizing cultural programmes, exhibitions, and meetings. After working hours the same auditorium is used for *indoor games* such as Basketball, Table Tennis, Badminton and etc.

The *infrastructural facility* of the college is also utilized by the *government* and *non-government organization* for conducting meetings, programmes, training classes, etc. without disturbing the regular functioning of the college.

A *Fine Arts Club* is functioning in the college to motivate and train students in cultural events like, dance, singing, playing instruments, drama, mime, painting, sculpture, etc.

A team of staff members is taking care of the functioning of Fine Arts Club. Members of the club represent the college in various cultural events conducted in other places.




 Layout of the library (individual reading carrels, lounge area for browsing and relaxed reading, IT zone for accessing e-resources)

Value Education, Personality Development and Soft Skills are included in the curriculum itself for under graduate students. Department of Psychology and Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college periodically organize programmes on career guidance and personality development. The individual departments organize programmes and guest lectures to expose the students to career opportunities. Communication Skill and Computer Literacy are provided to the freshers in the beginning of the academic year as Orientation programme / Bridge course.

### Performance enhancement for slow learners / students who are at risk of failure and dropouts

Remedial classes and special coaching classes are conducted for the slow learners / students who are at the risk of failures after the class hours. Students who are likely to discontinue the courses are identified and counseling is given to them by the concerned department staff members. Parents are also contacted in this regard.

### Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning / corporate / business houses, etc.

In-plant training, industrial visits and educational tours are arranged to expose the students to other institutions of higher learning / corporate / business houses. Information about other institutions of higher learning is displayed in the notice boards by the departments and Career Guidance and Placement Cell.

#### **Publication of student magazines**

The college publishes an annual magazine to bring out the talents of the students. The departments also publish magazines to provide a platform to exhibit their talents.

Students are encouraged and motivated to take part in sports and games. To find out the students who are interested in sports and games special selection events are conducted exclusively for the first year students.

Annual Intramural Sports are conducted and prizes are given. Students are given special coaching and TA/DA for attending sports competitions outside the institution. Special coaches are made available for different sports and games.

Sports students are given concession on fees.

Inter-departmental competitions are conducted every year to bring out the inherent talents of the students.

The *Fine Arts Club* of the college provides opportunity for the students to exhibit the talents in extracurricular activities by identifying the talented individuals and giving them training. Students are taken out to other institutions to participate in cultural competitions. TA/DA is given for participating in cultural competitions outside the institution.

Every year a mega inter-collegiate cultural competition, *Zephyr*, is organized by the Fine Arts Club of the college.

Students who participate in cultural competitions and sports and games are awarded two credits.

Sports competitions and cultural activities are conducted exclusively for the women candidates at the intra-institutional level.

The *Curriculum Development Cell* prepares the framework and with the help of the experts the syllabi for the courses are prepared. *Academic Audit* of the courses review the standard and continuous improvement in the standard is ensured.

Opportunities are given for staff members to equip themselves and excel in their profession.

Representatives from the industry are included in the board of studies to make the curriculum suitable for industries. Experts from the industry are invited to give guest lectures.


Possibility for creating MOUs with industries is being studied.

Apart from these mechanisms auditing also has a role in monitoring.

External auditing is carried out by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the management. The auditing is done every year.

The college also receives funds from government organizations for conducting seminars, workshop and awareness programmes.

The college obtained 12(B) status in September 2015 and has applied for grants in specific areas.

The college conducts academic audit once in three years to review curriculum, syllabi, teaching learning process, examination results, research activities and extra-curricular activities of the departments.

Two external experts for each department review the details provided by the department and also carry out on campus analysis and verification.

The last academic audit was carried out in the year 2014-2015.

Based on the recommendations by the members of academic audit the syllabi of departments were improved and necessary changes were made in the curriculum.

The use of ICT tools has been stressed and extended to many departments.

Laboratory facilities have been improved in science courses.

Question pattern of certain subjects were modified according to the suggestions made in the academic audit.

The teaching learning process is monitored by the respective Heads of the Departments at the department level.

The Principal of the college directly involves in the monitoring of teaching learning.

The College Council also reviews the process by analyzing the examination results.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college also takes part in the process by obtaining feedback from the students.

### 6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college has prepared the stated quality policy of the college and coordinates the various stakeholders of the institution in marching towards excellence.

The IQAC ensures quality sustenance process by periodically monitoring and reviewing the various activities of the institution.

Based on the inputs from the *academic audit*, *feedback from stakeholders* and *students forum*, the IQAC plan strategies for maintaining the quality.

### 6.5.7 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centres, etc.?

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the college is entrusted to monitor the administrative and academic departments of the college by reviewing their activities and collecting feedback from the students.

The Academic Audit has to be carried out once in three years to review the curriculum, syllabus and research output of the departments.

The College Council and the Planning and Evaluation Committee are also given the responsibility to review the academic and administrative processes periodically.

Any additional information regarding Governance, Leadership and Management, which the institution would like to include.

Respect Each Other principle is followed at all levels to ensure co-operation among the staff members.

To ensure accountability and to track record of events every department is maintaining a *Chronicle Register*.

College Council meets every month to discuss and plan proposed activities of the institution. Thus, time delay in taking decisions is minimized.

#### CRITERIA VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

### 7.1.1 Does the College conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Green audit of the campus is carried out once in a year.

### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

The institution believes that a *Green and a Clean Campus* is a pre-requisite for healthy body and mind. Initiatives are taken at all levels to maintain the campus eco-friendly. Various clubs and social service organizations such as NSS, NCC, Rotaract and Enviro Club of the college plan and execute environment conscious programmes.

#### • Energy conservation

Awareness programmes that emphasize the *importance of saving electricity* and minimizing power consumption are regularly carried out. Instructions are given to the students and the staff members to put-off lights and fans when they are not in use.

LED lights are fitted in the new buildings to reduce power consumption.

In the existing seminar halls the fluorescent bulbs are being replaced with CFL (Compact Fluorescent Lights) bulbs.

#### Use of renewable energy

Importance of *renewable energy is emphasized* through the activities of NSS, Enviro Club and the Department of Physics.

A proposal on installation of solar power panels is under the consideration of the management.

#### • Water harvesting

Rain water harvesting is being done in all the blocks of the campus to enhance the replenishment of ground water.

#### • Check dam construction

Not applicable

#### • Efforts for Carbon neutrality

Every year trees are planted to combat pollution.

#### Plantation

Tree plantation is one of the major activities of NSS and Enviro Club. Almost all the trees fallen during the Thane Cyclone have been replaced with new saplings in the campus.

#### Hazardous waste management

No hazardous waste is produced in the campus.

#### • e-waste management

The obsolete computers and other electronic wastes are calculated and disposed off through authorized e-waste dealer.

The Department of Computer Applications has conducted a pilot study on e-waste management.

#### • any other

- *Usage of paper is minimized* in the official communications and replaced with electronic mails (Circulars and announcements, Pay slips, etc.)
- Use of plastics and polythene bags are minimized inside the campus.
- *Vermicomposting pits are maintained* by the Department of Zoology and the compost produced is used as manure in the garden.

### 7.2 Innovations

# 7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

The institution in its mission to provide quality education has introduced several innovative practices. Some of the practices are listed below:

#### **Orientation Programme for the first year students**

Students who are entering into higher education will have their own hesitation and uneasiness. To make them comfortable in the new atmosphere and make them familiar with the rules and regulations, for the past two years an orientation programme is conducted for the first year students. The programme covers *Autonomous System, Computer Literacy, Campus Facilities, Rules and Regulations of the college* and *Library*. This programme has been found to be useful for the students who are from rural background.

#### **MOODLE** based Teaching-Learning

MOODLE is a practice followed by the Department of Computer Applications. MOODLE is an online tool which is used to extend the scope of teaching and learning to a broader level. Using MOODLE the staff members will upload the course materials prepared by them and this will enable the students to access the same online from anywhere. Many students are finding this method useful.

#### **Computer based test for CIA**

To reduce time and the use of papers, a computer based test is conducted in selected subjects for CIA on trial basis. Students can take-up the examination with *multiple choice questions through computers* and have to answer them within a given period of time. The results are available immediately after the exam. Both students and staff members find it useful in terms of time consumption. The Department of Computer Applications has introduced this innovative type of test for their students.

#### Talk on my research

To develop research attitude among students and staff, Research Development Cell of the college conducts a series programmes under the banner *Talk on my Research*. Staff members with Ph.D. from various departments of the college are asked to share their research work and experience in this programme. Staff members are given 30 minutes to present and share their experience which is followed by a 10 minutes interaction. So far three programmes have been conducted in which 6 staff members have presented their research.

### **Cash Award for best paper publication**

To encourage the staff members to do research and publish papers the institution has established an endowment fund from which a cash award, *Rev. Fr. G. Peter Rajendiram Award for Best Paper* is given to those who publish paper in reputed journals. This has motivated the staff members to publish quality research papers.

#### **Real-time Application Software Projects by the students**

Final year PG students of Computer Science department have projects in their curriculum. Some of the students carry out these projects as real time projects in industries and corporate offices. Based on the requirement of the industries and offices students develop application softwares which are used by the industries / offices. These projects help the students to get hands on experience and increase the employability.

#### **Alumni as Resource Persons**

The college has a good rapport with the alumni who often visit the institution. Alumni who are working in educational institutions, industries / corporate sectors and research institutes are invited to give lectures to the students and share their knowledge. Such type of practice encourages and honours the alumni and inspires the students.

### **BEST PRACTICE - I**

#### 1. Title of the Practice

## **Contribution towards a Sustainable Environment**

## 2. Objectives of the Practice

The purpose of higher education is to produce responsible human beings who make this world a happy place to live in. In a world where industrialization and technological advancement do more harm than good, Education must show the way towards a sustainable environment, St. Joseph's College realizes its commitment in this aspect and sets the following goals to achieve it.

- To have a green, eco-friendly campus.
- To create environmental awareness among the students and the public.
- To motivate the student community to create and maintain a green, pollution free environment.

#### 3. The Context

We live in the world which is to be shared by the living and non-living entities of not only the present and also of the future. Cuddalore District is geographically divided into agricultural lands at one side and sea at the other end. While manmade disasters like industrial pollution shatters the district at one end, natural calamities like tsunami, floods and cyclone tarnishes at the other end. Reducing the man made damage by educating the people about pollution is a viable option. The environmental damages caused by the intrusion of sea water, soil erosion, loss of trees due to cyclones have to be rectified by active participation of mankind. Tree plantation can solve the issue of changing of climate to some extent. The student force can be effectively utilized for this purpose and hence St. Joseph's College has developed strategies to make the students' environment conscious.

#### 4. The Practice

- The various departments of the institution and the student support social service organizations, including biological departments and Enviro Club, were sensitized about the environmental awareness and activities.
- Awareness programs were periodically conducted by the departments and student service organization in the form of seminars, rallies, exhibitions, competitions, etc.
- Action components are ensured in the activities of all the groups.
- Enviro club of the college took major share in the environmental activities. Guest lectures, competition for the students, exhibitions for the students, were arranged.
- Field visits to ecologically important places, environmental related research institutes were arranged for all the II year UG students who study Environmental Science as a compulsory paper.
- Departments irrespective of their subject specialization, organized environmental related programs.
- Tree plantation was carried out not only within the campus but also places in and around the college.
- Environmental related topics like *E-Waste Management*, *Vermicomposting* and *Renewable Energy* were also given importance in addition to tree plantation and pollution.
- The Department of Computer Applications has conducted a pilot study on e-waste management and developed strategies to reduce e-waste. An awareness programme on e-waste management has been conducted for the faculties and technical assistants of Computer Science and Computer Application departments.

## 5. Evidence of Success

- Vermicomposting has been promoted as an alternative to the use of chemical fertilizer. The Department of Zoology carries out vermicomposting project in which students as well as farmers are trained.
- The college joins hands with the NGO, Namma Cuddalore (meaning Our Cuddalore) in projects like water management, conservation of water and water sheds and fostering ecosystem.

Hundreds of volunteers from the college took part in a rally on 12.02.2016 to conserve water and watersheds and to remove *Seemai Karuvelam trees (Prosopis juliflora)*.

- Trees which fell down during the *Thane Cyclone* on 26<sup>th</sup> December 2011 in and around the campus were replaced by planting new saplings. It was an immediate action taken by the student support service organization of our college like NSS, NCC and YRC.
- The Department of Computer Applications has opted tree plantation as one of the mission and is carrying out the tree plantation project for the past 5 years. Hundreds of trees were planted in about 15 areas by the strenuous efforts of the Department.
- In addition, the department of computer applications has conducted *Environmental Awareness Programme* in 11 schools during the last five years alone.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Though the programs listed above are focusing on socially related issues, the main idea of environmental consciousness is not spared from criticism. Some of the teaching faculty and the few parents are of the opinion that environmental issues cannot be in the main sheet of the education. It is really hard to convince such people.

Secondly, though student's show much interest and take part in field related activities of the Environmental science, many are not interested in knowing the scientific aspect of it. Another problem encountered is that the convenience enjoyed by the organizers in carrying out awareness programme against action oriented programme. Next reason is that, more finance is needed for conducting action oriented than for awareness programme.

## **BEST PRACTICE - II**

#### 1. Title of the Practice

# Promoting research culture among the staff and students

## 2. Objectives of the Practice

The following have been set as the objectives of the institution to promote research in the institution.

- To create awareness among students on research.
- To sensitize the faculty to carryout research projects.
- To increase the number of research publications and research projects in the institution.

### 3. The Context

St. Joseph's College is a renowned institution having 25 years of excellence. The institution is known in the surroundings for its academic achievements, especially for the examination results, and the heavy demand in admission is mainly due to this reason. But with the changing scenario in the higher education, where research is being given equal importance as to teaching-learning, the institution fails to concentrate on research. This fact was reflected in the report of the NAAC in the previous two cycles also. Most of the staff members were little reluctant in taking up research activities and the mindset of the teaching faculty has to be changed. Students are also not aware of the importance of research. Not much research publications were from the institution in the past. There was an urgent need to promote research culture in the institution.

## 4. The Practice

- The Heads of the departments were instructed to motivate their staff and students about research.
- Series of seminars were conducted to create research awareness.
- Workshops were conducted at the department level and institutional level on research methodology, project writing, and writing scientific papers.
- Research Development Cell was assigned the responsibility of disseminating information on research schemes/ funding etc.

- Details of research activities (paper presentation / publication / attending seminars / workshop) were listed out staff wise / department-wise and displayed to encourage the participants and motivate others.
- Efforts were taken to obtain 12(B) status from the UGC and the college achieved this milestone in September 2015.
- Provision for duty leave to attend seminar and workshop was made available for the staff members.
- Cash award for the best paper publication was instituted.
- To strengthen the quality of the research by the M.Phil. scholars presentation / publication of paper from the research work is made mandatory to submit dissertation.
- Purchase of latest instruments was encouraged.
- Common instrumentation centre is established with the aim of facilitating research.
- An in house journal *St. Joseph's Journal of Humanities and Science* was introduced to facilitate publication.
- Talk on My Research programme was initiated in which faculty with Ph.D. will give a talk.
- Special funds were made available to each department to conduct seminars and workshop.

#### 5. Evidence of Success

With the efforts taken, staff members got motivated who in turn motivated the student on research. Number of seminars / conference / workshop conducted increased. The number of papers presented by the faculty increased. M.Phil. scholars and PG students started presenting papers in conference / seminars. Many M.Phil. scholars published their research work before submitting their dissertation. Many staff members started pursuing Ph.D. programme. *Talk on My Research* programme received over whelming response from the staff and students.

## 6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Sudden expansion of research activities caused a slight imbalance in Teaching-Research. With more number of UG classes, staff members were mostly occupied by teaching. Since 12(B) status has been granted only recently, the college is yet to receive funding from UGC and because of this financial burden of the management has increased.

Investment on advanced instruments could not be made within a short period and for some of the advanced laboratory tests to be carried out were outsourced. Mobilizing funds / grants is still a difficult task.

In addition to the best practices mentioned above the institution has several other best practices. A few of them are noted here.

## **Bridge Course for the first year students**

Students entering in to college from school often find it difficult to cope up with the advanced syllabus. To bridge the gap in the level of learning, additional classes are taught before the commencement of the regular courses every year. The institution conducts Bridge Courses for the first year students on subjects like, English (Communication English) and Mathematics. This programme reduces the stress of the students and help them acclimatize to the new courses easily.

## **Computer Literacy Programme**

Students from rural background do not have much opportunity to learn and use computers, especially those from non computer science courses. Hence a *Computer Literacy Programme* is offered to get themselves familiar with computers when they join in first year. Study material prepared by the staff of Computer Science and Computer Applications is provided to the students to help in understanding.

#### **Financial Assistance**

Most of the students joining St. Joseph's College are from economically weaker sections and who could not get admission in government colleges. Many of them are unable to pay the fees after joining the college. To help such students to complete the course without much financial burden, concession in fees, in some cases free education, is given. Students who show outstanding performance in sports are also given concession. On an average every year 730 students have benefitted through fees concessions which amounts to rupees 24 lakhs per year.

### **Establishment of endowment scholarships**

To encourage students who excel in studies and show outstanding performance, endowment scholarships are established in the institution by philanthropists. About 70 scholarships have been instituted so far.

#### **Staff Tour**

To give a break to the staff members from the routine activity tour programmes are arranged every year. The entire expenses are borne by the institution.

#### **Feedback**

To sustain the quality and improve the standard, suggestions and opinions from the stakeholders are regularly collected by the IQAC of the college. The outcome of the feedback are analysed and informed to the authorities for consideration and further action.

### **Interdisciplinary Research**

With the development of science in various fields, the possibility of carrying out interdisciplinary research is studied by the institution. Thrust areas for research are identified in each department to promote interdisciplinary research. A project has been jointly initiated by the Department of Microbiology and Department of Social Work of the college. A few of the PG and M.Phil. projects include interdisciplinary work as a component. In case of PG and M.Phil. research projects, part of the work is carried out as an interdisciplinary work among the departments of Chemistry, Microbiology and Biochemistry.

### Monthly Report / Six Months Plan and Report

Every month the members of the teaching faculty submit the report of various activities carried out by them to the IQAC. These reports are reviewed by the IQAC and Management.

Before the start of every semester, proposed plan of academic as well as co-curricular / extra-curricular activities are collected from each faculty member and also from the departments. This process helps the faculty members to have focused tasks and assignments. This also ensures the co-ordination of activities and in completing the tasks in timely manner. After the completion of the activities a final report is submitted to the IQAC at the end of the semester.

#### POST-ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The college has undergone assessment and accreditation by the NAAC in the year 2003 for the first time with B++ and got reaccredited in 2011 with 'A' grade. Since then, the institution has taken initiative to enhance and sustain the quality in all the criteria identified by NAAC. Some of the post-accreditation initiatives are described below.

## **Curricular aspects**

Academic audit was carried out to check the quality of syllabus, curriculum, library facility, question pattern, exam results laboratory facilities and research output. The suggestions from the academic audit were forwarded to the departments to enhance their performance. Curricular development cell was instrumental in the curriculum enhancement.

Board of studies was restructured for all courses and the inclusion of alumni and industrial/corporate representation was ensured.

## **Teaching – Learning**

To enable e-learning, e-books were made available in the central library and in the departments. More LCD projectors were purchased for ICT enabled teaching. Old computers were replaced with new ones.

## **Teacher Quality**

Staff members were motivated to attend more number of seminars and workshops to widen their subject knowledge. Special OD leave were given for deserving candidates to attend seminars and workshop. A series of staff development programmes have been organized. Performance Self Appraisal has been made rigorous for the staff members to identify the areas in which they have to improve.

#### **Orientation towards Research**

To increase research activities more seminars and conferences were organized. Special funds were allocated to the departments to organize programmes. To improve the quality of M.Phil. research, presentation and publications of the research work before the submission of the dissertation is made mandatory.

An in-house research journal is being published biannually. Interdisciplinary research is promoted among the departments.

## **Infrastructure Development**

An old building has been rebuilt to have an additional floor to accommodate more students. PG and research labs were upgraded and additional materials were purchased. More shelters were built for the students to sit during the leisure hours. New spacious building was constructed for canteen.

Old air conditioners were replaced in seminar halls and laboratories. A new seminar hall was built. Additional toilet blocks were constructed. Boys hostel was shifted to new site and the old block was converted to class rooms and staff rooms.

WiFi facility is provided to the staff and student throughout the campus.

To support advanced research and analysis, a Common Instrumentation Centre with necessary equipments has been established.

## **Student support**

Mentoring system was strengthened. Student forum meetings were conducted and the opinions of the students were given consideration. Feedback provided an opportunity for the students to express their views anonymously about the teachers, infrastructure and curriculum. Orientation programme and bridge courses are conducted for the students before the beginning of the academic year.

#### Administrative reforms

Committees were reshuffled to accommodate new comers. Departments were given more autonomy to extend decentralization. Major salary revision was done to encourage staff members. Release of PF and gratuity were speeded up for those staff members who have the institution.

Academic calendar is prepared in advance for each academic year to accommodate all activities of the institution. The calendar is printed in the handbook and uploaded in the website to make it known to all the stake holders




