The Board of Studies for English met on the afternoon of 05.04.2016 and after a careful analysis, the syllabus for **I Year B.A. / B.Sc. Semester I & II in English Through Literature** was revised and finalized to be prescribed from the academic year 2016 onwards.

The Board of Studies for English met on the afternoon of 05.04.2016 to effect a thorough revision of the syllabi for Part II – English ie, **English Through Literature Semester I & II** for First year students who pursue B.A and B.Sc degree courses.

The focus of this revision is to promote communication skills among the learners who hail from a rural background.

The experts have recommended the unit wise division of the syllabi where in each unit comprises the four language skills – Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing. The Department has set the novel trend to enhance the fluency of the language users.

English Through Literature

Semester I

Listening skill: In this category, students are introduced to the basic speech sounds [Consonants, Vowels, Diphthongs] and in the last unit, the students are trained to transcribe words.

Speaking skill: The Board has recommended the introduction of conversation (dialogues), Exchange of Greetings, Handling Telephone Enquiries etc. which ensures the communication ability.

Reading skill: In order to have a flair for the language through literature, prose, poem, short story and an One-Act Play have been introduced.

Writing skill: Composition work like Letter writing, Dialogue writing and Reading Comprehension are introduced. In addition to this, Grammar components like Sentence Construction, Parts of Speech, Articles, Verbs and Pronouns are introduced to bridge the course.

The Board has also approved the following Question Pattern:

[For Semester I & II]

Units I and II are prescribed for I CIA and Units III and IV are prescribed for II CIA. Lots of Group Activities are included to improve the communicative ability of the students.

English Through Literature**Semester II**

This paper is also framed based on L-S-R-W format. The main objective of this syllabus is to develop the art of communication and appreciate the beauty of life through Literature.

Listening skill: Advanced chapters in Phonetics such as Triphthongs, Strong and Weak forms in Transcription, Relationships between Spelling and Sound and Transcription of Sentences are introduced.

Speaking skill: Making requests, Inviting people, Apologising, Paying Compliments and such Speech activities are introduced as dialogues in all the units.

Reading skill: Humorous prose pieces, a thought provoking poem, a biographical piece [by a contemporary writer] and a select scene from Shakespeare's play are prescribed for reading and appreciation.

Writing skill: Precis writing, Note-making Report writing and Paragraph writing are included under this skill. Besides, Agenda and Minutes of the meeting are prescribed for B.A and B.Sc students.

Grammar components like correct usage of Articles, Prepositions and Tenses, Punctuation and in addition, Prefixes and Suffixes are also included.

It is decided to have the **same Question Paper Pattern** for **Semester I & II** for maintaining uniformity. Lots of group activities are designed to improve the conversational style of the students.

The Board of Studies has commended the worth of the syllabi as an innovative step by the Department of English.

DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH**Minutes of the 9th Academic Council dated 22.04.2016**

The Board of Studies for English met on the afternoon of 05.04.2016 to revise the syllabi for Part-II English (for I year B.A., B.Sc. degree courses) i.e., English Through Literature (presently **Functional English**).

The proposed syllabi were presented in the 9th Academic Council held on 22.04.2016 for approval. The following recommendations were made:

(i) **The nomenclature English Through Literature has been changed to Functional English** which is appropriate as the revised syllabi primarily focuses on Language skills along with literary pieces.

(ii) The council also insisted to divide the **syllabus for each semester into 5 units** instead of 4 to maintain uniformity.
